

Entrance and Dismissal Procedures

Students will enter and exit through designated doors (see below). We kindly ask that parents drop off their children at the designated doors between 8:10 AM and 8:20 AM. For dismissal at 2:30 PM, parents will meet their children at the crosswalk. Pre-primary parents may come to the front steps to collect their children, but please avoid gathering there to reduce congestion. Older siblings (Grades 1-6) should wait on the sidewalk when picking up younger students.

Students enrolled in the Community Centre Afterschool program will be met by staff near the Fire Hall. Parents and guardians are requested to call ahead if picking up a child early for an appointment. Early dismissals will occur at the front door.

To ensure student safety, the entrance to the parking lot will be closed from 8:05 AM to 8:30 AM and again from 2:20 PM to 2:30 PM. Only staff will be permitted to enter during these times. The daycare van and Special Needs Bus will drop off and pick up students at the front door.

Visitors

We warmly welcome you to our school and appreciate your involvement in our school community. For the safety and well-being of all students, we kindly request that families and visitors sign in at the office upon arrival. To ensure health and safety measures are upheld and to minimize classroom disruptions, we ask that you please wait at the office while our administrative assistant or a member of the administration assists you.

Student Transportation/Bussing

Bus transportation is available for students from Pre-Primary to Grade 6 who live more than 1.6 km from the school. If your child is eligible for the bus, you should have received an email during the first week of September.

For students living within 1.6 km, courtesy bussing may be requested by completing an online application [here] or by contacting Connect@HRCE at 902-431-4723 or emailing transportation@hrce.ca to request courtesy bussing for Nelson Whynder.

Please note that all students riding the bus must be registered for safety and contact tracing purposes.

ATTENDANCE

Research has proven that students who attend school on a daily basis, arrive prepared, and on time for classes, are much more successful in school. The staff of Nelson Whynder Elementary School monitors daily attendance very closely and look forward to communicating with parents in order to help students maintain a positive focus on their academics. The following guidelines have been established to make sure that attendance does not become an issue:

- Students arriving late for school will be greeted by someone from the office.
- Please phone the administrative assistant at 462-6030 or use the Safe Arrival School Messenger (see below) before classes begin if your son or daughter is ill or has another legitimate reason for being absent, otherwise you may receive an automated call from the system.
- Please ensure the school has up to date contact information.
- Parents are asked to contact the Office if they need to pick up students during the day for an appointment. Students will meet parents/guardians at the front door.

SAFE ARRIVAL BY SCHOOLMESSENGER

A New Way for Families to Report Student Absences

One of our greatest priorities is ensuring all students arrive at school safely each day. Parents/guardians of students who attend our school now have the option to report their child's absence in advance using a toll-free number, the PowerSchool Parent Portal or an app!

SchoolMessenger SafeArrival – an absence management system that improves student safety and makes it easy for families to inform their child's school if they will be away – powers all three of these options.

If your child will be absent, please let us know by using one of the following methods:

- **Toll-Free Number -** Call 1-833-582-6940 to report an absence using an automated system.
- **PowerSchool Parent Portal** Log into<u>https://sishrsb.ednet.ns.ca/public/</u> and access the SchoolMessenger website to report an absence.
- **SchoolMessenger App** Download the SchoolMessenger app for Android and iOS devices and sign up using your PowerSchool username (full email address).

TEACHING AND LEARNING

The teachers at Nelson Whynder Elementary School focus on supporting student achievement. Therefore, teaching and learning opportunities are varied so that students can demonstrate their learning using their various talents, strengths, and gifts. We expect to set our students up for excellence. Staff are committed to increase student learning and support well-being in keeping with Nova Scotia Inclusive Education Policy, Teaching standards and student success planning, with a culturally responsive, Africentric, Anti-racist approach to education. Through a team approach including parents/guardians, we will guide our students to success.

HOMEWORK

Homework is important to students' success in our school. It helps students review and practice what they have learned and helps to develop independent learning. Homework for example can look like reading a just right book, journaling and writing about their experiences, and practicing math facts through games. HOME SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Home School Communication is very important. Teachers will communicate in a variety of ways including classroom newsletters, phone calls and emails. Parents/guardians are encouraged to contact teachers to discuss their child's progress and school experiences. Parents should feel free to contact their student's

teacher via e-mail or through the school phone. Please note teachers have up to two teaching days to return or respond to parent phone calls and/or emails.

Curriculum Night, Parent/Teacher interviews and Parent engagement events are a good way for home and school to connect and leap up to date with curriculum and student progress. We are excited that we can again meet with our parents in person. Please see the calendar.

BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Healthy foods are important during school age years for growth and learning. For this reason, Nelson Whynder Elementary has a **Breakfast Program** which will provide a variety of individually packed healthy foods. Breakfast is delivered to the classrooms and is available to students from 8:20 -8:30 am. Breakfast program will begin Sept 16th.

LUNCH

Lunchtimes run from 11:30 – 12:20 for all classes. We are happy to announce our universal lunch program which will begin Monday, October 28. The ordering window for menu selection will be October 18-23 online. More information will be provided.

WATER FOUNTAINS

The use of the fountains are for bottle filling only. For health reasons the option to drink directly from the mouth has been removed. Please ensure your child comes to school with a water bottle.

SCHOOL LIBRARY

Our school library has a great collection of books from a variety of categories. We are constantly updating our selection. We also make it a priority to purchase high interest and fun Africentric books. Students are expected to return the borrowed books by the due date so other children can enjoy the books as well.

MEDICATIONS

Students who require taking medication at school must provide the necessary documentation required by the HRCE administration of medication policy from their parent or guardian, authorizing the use of the substance. All medications (both prescribed and over the counter) are to be distributed by authorized school personnel after completion of appropriate forms.

ALLERGIES/HEALTH CARE PLANS

Parents/Guardians of students with severe allergies or other health related difficulties are required to familiarize school staff at the beginning of each school year in order to ensure that the proper treatment may be administered in an emergency situation. Please ensure the medical section is updated on the Registration form sent home in September.

Life-Threatening Allergies

Nelson Whynder Elementary School kindly asks that all families continue to respect our Life-Threatening Allergy Policy. Please note that students and staff have life-threatening allergies, including those to **nuts**, **eggs**, **poultry**, **fish**, **shellfish**, **and various scent sensitivities**. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated, as it helps us maintain a safer environment for everyone.

FIELD TRIPS/SPORTS EVENT/COMMUNITY OUTINGS

A permission form to allow students to access the Arnold D. Johnson Sports field and other areas of the community off school property during school hours with staff supervision will be coming home in September. Students must have permission forms signed before they can attend a field trip, sports event or community outing.

REGISTRATION AND SELF IDENTIFICATION

Each year it is necessary to update our student information files. Our students will be bringing a registration form home in September which is to be updated and returned to the school. In addition to the basic information the form also contains a section for emergency contact, emergency dismissal instructions, medical information, media release consent, and request for French Language schooling and. Also, there is a section entitled Student Self Identification; Parents/Guardians and/or students are encouraged to self-identify. By doing so, this enables the Department of Education and HRCE to have a greater awareness of the diversity of the student population and the communities served and to better access resources to meet the needs of students.

CELEBRATING STUDENT SUCCESS

At Nelson Whynder Elementary, we are very proud of the success of our students within classrooms and beyond. We celebrate the success of our students in a variety of ways such as monthly positive participation awards, Nelson Whynder Boss Awards, Positive Office Referrals, shout-outs during announcements and in school newsletters, positive phone calls to parents, as well as individual and class rewards.

TECHNOLOGY-PERSONAL DEVICES BROUGHT FROM HOME
