A celebration for the whole family! There will be games, food, entertainment, and more. We look forward to seeing you there as we close the school year with joy and togetherness.


Thank you, as always, for your ongoing support. When families and schools work together, great things happen for children. Let's continue to build a strong, caring, and thriving school community—together.

May 15 is Black Excellence Day

The following are ways you celebrate the fourth annual Black Excellence Day: Celebrating achievements: Black Excellence Day provides an opportunity to celebrate the achievements, contributions, and successes of Black individuals within the community. It highlights the talent and accomplishments within the Black community, ensuring that Black students have an opportunity to highlight all their positive contributions within the education system.



Promoting equity and inclusion: Recognizing Black Excellence fosters a culture of equity and inclusion within schools. Access Awareness Week

- Proof of home address (a recently dated official government or utility document with your current address that includes your name and date, such as water bill, power bill, internet bill, home fuel bill, a tax receipt, property assessment or a mortgage contract)

Enrollments for the 2025-26 school year are open. Please visit <u>www.hrce.ca</u> to complete the enrollment for your child.

Go to STUDENT REGISTRATION, verify YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD SCHOOL, have the following documents ready in electronic form: Proof of Identity (birth certificate, passport, immigration papers, legal adoption papers) and Proof of Address ((a recently dated official government or utility document with your current address that includes your name and date, such as water bill, power bill, internet bill, home fuel bill, a tax receipt, property assessment or a mortgage contract). Please note: a driver's license is <u>not</u> sufficient for Proof of Address!

Follow the link under READY TO PROCEED to complete your child's/children's registration. Only completed registrations will be processed at the school's end.

Safe Arrival



Safe Arrival If your child will <u>not</u> be attending school or will be late, it is imperative that you call the school's safe arrival line at **1-833-582-6940** or visit https://sishrsb.ednet.ns.ca/public/ to record them as absent. The automated system will call out for all unaccounted absences. If your child will be arriving late, please record them as absent, and the office will mark them present once they have arrived at school. The automated system is not set up to account for half day absences. Daily attendance and prompt arrival at school ensure your child(ren) and all other students in the class a successful start to their day. Missing even 10 minutes of a morning routine can interrupt student learning. We encourage parents to call the safe arrival line rather than calling the school.

School Bus Safety Reminder

More than 33,000 HRCE students take the school bus. Making sure they have a safe and happy trip to and from school is very important to us. Please talk with your child about school bus safety on a regular basis. Students should tell their bus driver and/or school principal if they have any problems.

Here are some important safety tips:

Bus Stop Safety

- Be on time for the bus. Don't run to or from the bus.
- Stand back when the bus arrives and give everyone space. Get on or off the bus one at a time.
- Always cross the road in front of the bus. Walk to a spot where you can see the driver. When they signal it's safe, walk to the middle of the road. STOP, LOOK, and LISTEN, then cross when it's safe.
- Never crawl under the bus or cross the road from behind it.

School Bus Safety

- Respect and listen to the driver. Their job is to focus on the road, so avoid distracting them.
- Respect others and your space.
- Keep noise levels down.
- Stay seated while the bus is moving.
- Keep your arms, legs, and head inside the bus.
- Do not throw anything inside or outside the bus.
- Keep the aisle clear.



Did you know: It's illegal for drivers to pass a school bus when it has stopped with its red lights flashing. Bus drivers will activate their amber lights 150m before they stop as a warning to motorists.


