SAC members met monthly with a combination of in-person and virtual meetings. During each meeting they were given an update on the activities of the school and at the end of each term assessment data graphs were presented. We discussed and decided upon priorities for the spending of funds to support the goals of SSP and STEM. As a collective group we engaged in contributing to the following:

- Completed School Food & Nutrition Policy Survey June 2023

SAC is committed to supporting the academic achievement and well-being of students. In the Fall, SAC suggested the purchase of the Black Gold Project Affirmation Cards for each class. We also approved the purchase of literacy & math resources, STEM supplies, as well as equipment to support classrooms & library (Bookshelves, reading mats etc.).

Our SAC hosted a parent conference with the theme *Africentricity in Action*. Our goal was to provide parents with information on what Africentricity is and the connectedness to Education and cultural responsiveness in policy and day to day practice. We welcomed keynote speaker Rachel Ross along with additional presenters Ken Fells and Karen Hudson. The day also consisted of rotating workshops in Literacy, Social Studies and STEM facilitated by NWES teachers/SAC members and a panel of community partners in education who represented the following organizations: United for Literacy Preston Township Program, Preston Area Learning Skills (PALS), and the BEA Cultural Academic and Enrichment Program (CAEP). Babysitting was available for SAC members and participants as needed.
