

Notes from Your School Counsellor

Grief is a complicated feeling to deal with at all ages and can show up in different ways for children depending on their developmental stage. I had the opportunity to take a course on childhood grief and wanted to share a few takeaways with parents.

Common misconceptions about childhood grief

MYTH: Don't talk to children about death....

REALITY: Conversations about death can begin at any age if the child is curious. By 9 or 10 kids have a full understanding of the complexities of death.

MYTH: Don't say words like "death" and "dying"

REALITY: Using these real terms (rather than "passing" or "gone") creates less confusion for younger kids. Use simple language to explain death (ex. "their body stopped working and will never work again")

MYTH: Children shouldn't be around someone dying or go to funerals

REALITY: If a child is curious and wants to be involved in a death or funeral, it is suggested that adults honor this wish.

MYTH: When someone is sick or dying children think about it all the time

REALITY: Children grieve in "chunks" over the short and long term. They can go from extreme grief to happiness very quickly and may experience grief bursts for short periods of time and then nothing again for years. This leads to adults thinking a child is "over it" before they really are. Don't be afraid to check-in with them. With adults there is often a fear that if you experience the grief you won't come out of it. As caregivers we can slowly build confidence that we can live with grief. Grief can't be fixed or distracted from.

If you are interested in children's books that talk about death and grief, reach out to the school and we can share some titles or lend some books.


